Paul Cormany - "Two tournaments so far this year and twice I've fished with Howard Thomas and both times we won. Howard and I would like to be permanently paired if that's okay with the rest of the club.

I spent all day Tuesday on the water marking bed fish. I wasn't

very happy with the fish I found in practice and figured I would only come up with about 18 pounds. At least I knew a lot of areas I wouldn't fish during the tournament and that I would need to spend Wednesday trying to locate better fish.

The plan was to catch everything I marked that was 3 pounds or better and then start looking for better fish. The second cast of the day gave up a 3 1/2 lb smallie off the first of many beds we would fish. We caught two more in short order and ran to the next area. I pulled up on the next mark and caught a 4 lb smallie on the first cast on that bed. The next mark was about 100 yards away and I told Howard we would use the electric motor in case I had missed anything in practice. About half way, Howard said "There's a big

one!" I looked down and couldn't see a bed and Howard kept pointing out the fish until I finally found it - a nice 5 lb plus largemouth. I watched it for about ten minutes until I saw two white shells in a small patch of grass that marked the bed. I tried the dropshot for a while, then a Beaver and finally a jig. The fish reacted best to the jig. I worked it for 45 minutes before it finally bit. I set the hook, got three cranks on it and it came unbuttoned. I was bummed to spend that much time on one fish only to watch it swim off into deep water. Howard suggested we move to the next bed but I wanted to wait and see if it would return. Five minutes later, it swam up onto the bed and I knew I could catch it. Fifteen minutes later, it bit the jig again and I had my hands full. I brought it to the boat twice and each time it would run and take drag. Finally it went into the net and we had five.

I went down to the next bed and caught a 4 lb plus smallie on the first cast. We moved to the next bed and I caught another good smallie that upgraded our limit again. We looked around that area and found a largemouth and a smallmouth about fifty feet apart. I worked the largemouth and Howard worked the smallmouth. I hooked the largemouth and it came unbuttoned. A couple casts later, Howard caught the smallie and we upgraded again.

We made a major move and

caught a few more smallies off of beds and had a couple of minor upgrades. I decided we needed to focus on largemouths the rest of the day unless we found a giant smallie. We tried several areas without finding an upgrade. I figured we were close to twenty pounds and it was going to be hard to find an upgrade. I was cruising the banks looking for beds in areas where I have caught quality fish in the past. I spotted what looked like a giant smallie bed and hoped it would have a fish on it. As I passed, I bumped a big fish off the bed and I told Howard we were going to stay there until I caught it. I could see the lateral line and figured it to be about a 6 lb largemouth. I could only see the fish when it would circle off the bed and could not see how it was reacting when it was on the bed. I spent an hour working the bed with the jig. I told Howard, "Maybe its a smallmouth." and I switched to the Gulp Minnow. The first cast with the Gulp Minnow and it was on! It was a largemouth but only in the high three's and I didn't think it would help. I also knew it was not the fish I saw

The Rules By Gary Grimes

Midweek Bass rules state the following: All "sight" fish must be hooked inside the mouth. If you can see the fish it is to be considered a "sight" fish. I was unfortunate to have to apply this rule on a nice largemouth at Havasu which I had foul hooked during his attempt to take my bait. I heard of this happening to many others as well.

earlier. Howard got it out of the net and put it and our smallest smallie on the balance beam. I made another cast on the bed and hooked the big one. That was the big fish at 5.94. We caught about a dozen fish in the next two hours but could never upgrade.

I have to admit I now know how a fish on a bed feels when you set the hook. At the weigh-in, Jack called our big fish at 4.94 lbs and I knew there was no way that fish was that light. Then he said, "Just kidding." Got me hard on that one Jack! Howard and I had a great time fishing together; too bad we won't get to do it again until next year."

Howard added this comment - "Folk's, I feel very lucky to have been chosen to fish with one of our club's top anglers. I have never fished with anybody as confident and organized as Paul Cormany. This man is deadly with his electronics. With his GPS co-

ordinances he was able to put the first two fish in the boat practically in the dark. You could not see the beds it was so dark, but with the right lure and weight he was able to feel the rocky bed, stay on it, and make the catch. So guys, if you have electronics on your boat and use them right you'll be doing yourself a big favor. Paul had a plan, we followed it to the letter and it all worked out in the end. Two rods were all we needed; a drop shot and a jig rod. Our big fish came on the smallest bait we were using, a Berkley Gulp Minnow. I know some of the guys call him "Santa Claus" and they are right as I am now celebrating Christmas in March. What a fabulous gift at this time of the year. Paul thanks again for making me a smarter and more knowledgeable angler. Since we can't fish together anymore this year I want to wish you the best of skill (I know now you don't rely on luck, just hard work), in all your up and coming tournaments in the club

and out. Thanks Paul."

up with someone who knew the lake and how to catch bedding fish. I won out on both counts. Tom and I worked well as a team and he was not bashful about giving me pointers on how to catch these bedding fish and sharing his wealth of knowledge. We were able to prefish Monday afternoon and all day Tuesday.

Monday afternoon after leaving the lake we stopped at a tackle shop and I bought a package of 3 inch white salt worms because I thought they might work. Tom called them sissy baits. I started throwing them on Tuesday morning and it seemed to me that the fish just wanted to kill it. After only a few hours we knew we had 5 fish close to 20 lbs, so the rest of the day we just marked beds on the GPS. I only had one package of the sissy baits so we decided to save them for the tournament. On Wednesday morning, the first spot we fished was an island near the marina. We had about 6 or 7 beds marked and we were able to pick up fish on nearly all of these beds. The first 3 fish we caught were close to 5 lbs each and we had to put them on a balance beam to determine which one was bigger. By 7:30 we had 5 fish in the boat and we were culling by 8 am. We knew that we had close to 20 lbs and we spent the rest of the day looking for that one big fish. We were actually throwing back 3 lb plus fish. What a thrill. This is the most fun I've had with all my clothes on."

Jack Hughes & Steve Simer Plan Well and Win 3rd Place

Team **Hughes & Simer** weighed five bass for 17.94 pounds and took home **Third Place** honors.

Steve Simer – "I was fortunate enough to draw Jack Hughes as a boater and Jack spent the required time on the water to find the right fish. We pre fished together on Tuesday and he showed me what he had found. We agreed on a simple plan. We knew the forecast called for wind, so we decided it would be best to go to our first spot and put 5 fish in the boat as quickly as we could before the wind started to blow. The plan worked perfectly....at least the start of the plan did.

We had our 5 fish in the boat within the first hour, fishing the more aggressive smallies on beds. Jack used a white Senko with a chartreuse tip and I used a white jig and pig. We really worked together well as a team, irritating the fish into

biting by both working the bed at the same time. I think one of the keys to our success was moving the boat into the correct position to bring the bait into the bed from the right direction. Smallies especially have an orientation to them that can trigger a bite. If you can figure out which way to bring the bait into the nest, you can make the fish more aggressive. Jack and I moved the boat around the bed until we figured out which direction the fish wanted the bait or didn't want the bait to enter the nest.

Once we had 5 in the box, we went hunting for bigger fish. Unfortunately, I foul hooked our largest fish of the day and we had to put her back in the water. She did not return to the bed, so we were unable to catch her again. Once the wind started to blow, our main lake beds became pretty much unfishable. We tried a couple of cuts on the California side as well as a couple of marinas on the Arizona side, but could only find fish of equal or smaller size than what we had in the boat. In the Marina, we found a couple of fish that could have upgraded us, but they were a little too interested in each other and paid no attention to our attempts to lure them in for a boat ride. We were unable to upgrade our catch and ended up weighing our first five fish.

We did catch a nice 1 pound 4 ounce blue gill in the Marina on a spinnerbait. We noticed a few shad busting on the surface, so we threw a

spinnerbait for a bit to see if we could get a roving largemouth to take the bait...to no avail.

One thing that was very interesting that we saw in the back of a marina was a group of about 20 Largemouth roving in a school. Almost like a summer school of fish. We thought that very unusual for this time of year. All in all we had a great time fishing with a great group of guys.

Jack added - "I would like to add a few other notes to Steve's comments and reinforce his comments on team work. This really was a team work win. Steve and I fished aggressively all day with both of us on the front of the boat most of the time. We also spit the time on the trolling motor almost equally and we found out on Tuesday during pre-fishing that boat placement was critical for almost each bed we fished and by Wednesday morning we had 71 beds marked on the GPS in different locations on both sides of the lake hoping that if the wind was high we still would be able to find a place to bed fish and that part of the plan worked well except we did not find any fish to upgrade the first five we caught.

One thing I learned this year when bed fishing was that if you and your partner are fishing different lures one of the two lures will clearly irritate the fish more when you cast it to the bed. Keep that lure moving slowly in the bed and bring the other lure through the bed as close as you can get it

to the lure that the fish does not like and by the third time of doing this the fish will give you a good reaction bite. It was all team work to make that happen.

The only fish we caught and that we could use to upgrade was foul hooked under the chin and was immediately released. When released it never went back to the bed and we came back to that bed four more times at least looking for it during the day. That smallie would have given us more than two and half pounds in upgrade and my digital scale showed it weighed 4.87 pounds.

Finally, Steve is a new member in the club and was fun to fish with, but most of all he is one quality gentleman that I am looking forward to fishing with again."

Team Lippincott & Jacobson Fish Hideaways for 4th Place

Brian's perspective on the day: "I was excited and troubled at the same time with being paired up with Clay. Excited because Clay and I haven't fished together in over 4 years but troubled because I know that he spends most of March at Havasu fishing tournaments for income. Since our club tournaments aren't for the same kind of income for him like his Saturday tournaments I thought that he'd only put us on smaller bass only which makes perfect sense to me. The more I thought about it I began to get excited again because our club

was designed to give anglers experience and to fellowship with others who enjoy this sport. That is why I've remained a part of this awesome club for a 4th year now! Clay is a pro so there would be something I'd gain from fishing with him, and that proved to be true. I joked that I paid \$125 to Clay for a guide trip because he called every fish that we'd come to, what to use, and we caught a lot! Clay and I talked before the tournament started and I told him that I was okay if he didn't want to disclose his key spots to me and he told me not to worry that he'd put us on some good fish and a solid bag and in the end that is exactly what happened.

The day started out with a long run. Clay told me that the first stop I'd get a nice smallmouth on drop shot. He gave me the worm to use, the weight to use, and adjusted the length between the weight and the hook. It was tough to see the bed but Clay told me about where to cast and how deep it would be. In a matter of maybe a minute we had probably a

2.5 lb smallmouth in the boat. He said "we're moving" so I buckled up my life jacket and on we went. We did this from spot to spot and as always he'd call it and tell me that I'd catch a smallmouth or a largemouth there. He knew what species and where they were every single time. After he knew I was comfortable and back into the grove of bed fishing he said that he'd take me to a spot where I'd find a smallmouth pig. He pointed out the bed about 25 yards out from the boat. As soon as it hit the bed the fight was on. After a little smallmouth fun we got our big fish of the day into the boat. What excitement! My heart was racing, Praise the Lord for this awesome experience. This was the largest smallmouth that I've ever caught in Arizona and the most fun that I had catching one to boot.

After that Clay pondered a bit and said that he probably shouldn't do this but he'd let me take a shot at a kicker which honestly shocked me knowing that he was giving up an opportunity at one of his big money fish, the reason why he spends money and time away from wife and home to fish up there. I told him that he didn't need to do that but he saw the excitement I had with the big smallmouth so he wanted to give me a shot at a big largemouth too. We went into some cover and he pointed out the corner of a bed hidden under some brush. He said to throw a jig so I broke out a new UV Bait (Craw color) and tossed it in. Clay helped with this one. He'd toss in and pull his jig out and then I'd toss in. Back and forth

we went and then my jig got nailed! The largemouth surfaced and promptly snapped my line. We saw it swim off with the UV jig in it's mouth into deeper water. When I reeled in Clay noticed that I wasn't fishing with straight braid and told me that whenever fishing cover like this I should only be fishing straight braid. I had braid to a 15 ft 15 lb Floro leader. My line nicked in several spots and knowing that Clay knows what he's talking about I cut it all off and then only went with straight braid on my jig rod for the remainder of the day. Clay broke the news to me that that fish was easily a 7+ and my heart just sank.

Clay then took me to another spot and asked if I was ready to try something different. It was a heavy cover area and he got down on his belly and put his rod under the water while trying look at the same time to catch a buried largemouth. He worked on it for a bit while I held us steady with a push pole. He then had me get on the deck and do the same thing he had been doing while he worked the trolling motor with his hand and watched out to see if the fish would swim out. I worked a tube and a craw. Clay told me to get the tub back in there and after about 15 minutes I got bit. I had to set the hook by pulling the line by hand (which I've never done before) because I couldn't swing it at that angle. Clay quickly got the net and we had a nice largemouth in

the boat. He said that there was a bigger one that he had caught there before but this smaller fish (just over 3 lbs) must have moved in on that vacant bed.

The day was wrapping up and Clay had just enough time to take me to one more toad. We saw what must have been in my estimation close to a 10 lb largemouth. It kept swimming around and wouldn't lock on the bed so we only threw at it a few times and Clay realizing that it was not interested at all moved us to another smallmouth bed. When we got to the bed Clay told me to get my drop shot rod ready. He threw in first and caught the male and held it at bay and told me to hurry up and toss into the bed. I didn't see another fish but did so because he told me to and quite quickly the female darted in and took the hook. When we got it in the boat it seemed to be a clone to the other 3 ½'s but just enough to throw one back and keep this one.

All and all it was a fantastic day that I won't forget. The Lord blessed us with a beautiful weather day and with a great fellowship and fishing experience with Clay. I hope to get the opportunity to fish with Clay again to gain some more valuable experience.

Team Cook & Royal Jig Way to 5th Place

Team **Steve Cook & Mark Royal** weighed five bass for 17.69 pounds and took home **5th Place** and thanks to a 4.81 lb bass caught by Steve, the team took home **2nd Place Big**

Fish honors.

Steve Cook - "I was fortunate to draw Mark Royal for this tournament. He is new to our club and this was his first tournament. Mark is a great guy to fish with and I had a blast. The boaters are going to love fishing with Mark.

Really nothing exciting to tell about the 'catching' part of the day; all the fish we weighed-in were caught on jigs and chatter baits."

Mark Royal - "This was my first tournament. Steve Cook was a consummate teacher and partner and I soon felt at ease on his boat. Seeing him map out a path through a couple of feet of water on pre-fish day and then on tournament day do 50 plus mph on that path was exciting.

I caught 3 bass, but by the end of the day all three were culled out with the bigger fish that Steve had caught. I caught all three on a Reaper off of beds. I also had a nice bass on while using a chatterbait, but I made the mistake of not keeping enough pressure on it with my rod down and it jumped and threw the lure.

It was a great learning experience and I plan to get out again next month."

15 Minute Fight Nets Goon Fish Prize for Team Tassin & Cunningham

Terry said - After a tough day of fishing beds and only putting five bass in the livewell, Doug decided to try something different. He cast out a crawfish

shaped plastic jig in 2 feet of water and slowly worked the bait back to the boat. After two lifts of the bait he cried out: "I got one!" Well then the fight was on. At first Doug thought he had a really big bass on. However, after 30 seconds of fighting the fish I said "That's no bass; it's probably a catfish or carp". Seven minutes into the fight Doug asked "Do you want to fight him for awhile?" I responded politely that "No it's your fish to lose or catch and I'll just net him". Well after 15 minutes of fighting the carp it was netted and in the boat; now the question was what to do with him. The fish was too large to put in a livewell (and who wants a carp in their livewell) so out came a nylon tow rope which was passed through the fishes' mouth. Then the carp was lowered back into the lake and tied off on the boat where it swam until it was time to head back to the ramp.

Back at the ramp it was decided to tie the fish off on the dock while the boat was loaded. Then Doug returned to retrieve the carp and take it to the weigh-in scale. The 19.97 lb fish was weighed and then returned to the lake - alive and kicking. What a fun day! Fishing with Doug Cunningham is always an 'interesting' experience! When I asked Doug for a comment about the carp, he said: "Just the fact it scared the @#\$\$!! out of me is about it."

Tournament Statistics

Forty-Three men fished 9 hours each, bringing 109 keeper bass to the scales for a total weight of 334.07 pounds with a 7.76 pound average catch per fisherman. All but one fish were released back into the lake after weigh-in to fight again another day.

The 5 Pound Pot will start over at the April, Lake Alamo tournament. Members wishing to join that pot must be paid for the April tournament, since it becomes a closed pot for future tournaments until a 5 lb or over bass is caught and

weighed in at the scales. As it has been said numerous times, any member can prepay the \$5.00 for tournaments in which he will be unable to fish and still remain in the pot.

Second Place, paying \$272, goes to the team of Tom Berry and Tom Alauria. They had a very respectable weight of 19.19 pounds.

Our tournament director, Jack Hughes, and his partner Steve Simer caught 17.94 pounds for a Third Place check of \$182.

Team Clay Lippincott and Brian Jacobson cashed in for \$90 and Fourth Place with a weight of 17.77 pounds. Also, club congratulations go out to Clay for a great WON tournament fished at Lake Havasu the weekend prior to our Midweek Bass tournament where he and his co-angler finished in Second Place and had the largest Bass of the tournament.

Second Place Big Fish, along with a fifth place finish, was worth \$228 for Steve Cook and Mark Royal with a total weight of 17.69 pounds.

The goon fish pot was won with a carp weighing 19.97 Pounds. The fishing ability of Terry Tassin and Doug Cunningham and the ingenious way that they brought that fish into the scales was worth \$210.

As I said earlier, I fished with a new member of the club, Steve Simer. Steve was a quality draw and for all you boaters remember the name, because he is fun to have in your boat and is an excellent fisherman. Steve, being from Wisconsin, was not use to the ladies attire during our boat ride under the bridge but he was an excellent co-pilot keeping his eyes on the water for unsafe potential traffic, thanks Steve because my eyes were wandering.

Remember to stock your boat with one of the fish products that help to keep them healthy, keep your water well oxygenated and cool with ice if you have any. At Havasu, Steve and I had a fish that almost immediately upon going in the well, went belly up and would not come around. We tried everything to keep him alive with zero results and my Catch and Release additive was on shore (I forgot to put it in the boat) then I remembered sitting on the boat last year drinking a Gator Aid and reading the label of Rejuvenate and the ingredients were almost the same. Steve thought I was nuts, when I said pour Gator Aid into him, he did and it worked, and within two minutes the fish was very lively and flopping in the live well and was returned to the lake after the weigh in. I am not saying it will always work but in this case it clearly worked.

Looking forward to seeing you all at our next club meeting and for sure at Alamo!

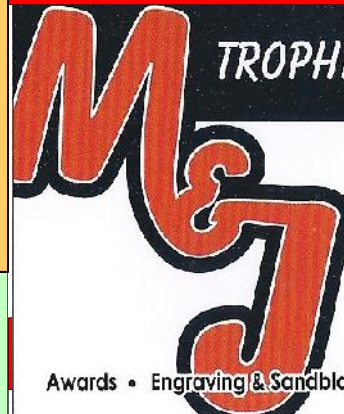
