Tournament Statistics

Fifty-two men fished 9 hours each, bringing 131 keeper bass to the scales for a total weight of 187.57 pounds with a 3.61 pound average total catch per fisherman. The average weight of each fish was 1.43 lbs. All but seven fish were released back into the lake after weighin to fight again another day.

Neil Burns: Doug and I started the day in the Salt end, just past Windy Hill, on the north side. I had fished this area the day before and had shaken off numerous fish. We fished mainly dark colored jigs on the rocky points and outside banks, casting right on the

shore down to about 15 feet. Doug caught a nice fish at the end of the day on a drop shot that certainly helped us.

Doug Cunningham: I always enjoy fishing with Neil Burns; Roosevelt was another day to put in the," Book of Neil." I started the morning cranking and Neil was flipping a finesse craw shallow on the main lake. Neil picked up a quick 3. I switched it up and ended up contributing. We had our limit early and began culling. We both missed a couple of nice ones but I am glad it really didn't matter. Things really slowed up later in the day. I ended up catching a nice one by the main bridge on a dropshot (Oxblood) that gave us an extra pound. I literally caught it 20 minutes before the tournament ended.

least 100 feet from the ramp) and fished the banks and outside brush. I caught the big fish at about 1:30 PM on the chatterbait in about 10 feet of water. All morning the fish bit in about 1 to 5 feet of water around grass and trees. We caught approximately 10 fish all day.



Larry White & Jim Buchanan Work Salt To Finish 3rd Place Overall

Team White & Buchanan weighed five bass for 8.79 pounds and took home Third Place honors.

Larry White: The weather was perfect; my partner was great, and interesting to fish with. A pattern I found a few weeks earlier but was unable to fully explore was there again in practice.

We headed straight for the Salt end of the lake and within several casts Jim Buchanan caught one of our better fish on a Buzz Bait. A few casts later I followed with a very acrobatic fish. We were culling in the first hour using Senko's, Buzz Baits and Walking Baits. If anyone catches a near 3 pound fish with a black culling rope attached, could you please



give the rope back as the fish left our boat's livewell about 11:30 with the tag in its mouth.



3rd Place Jim Buchanan & Larry White

Jim Buchanan: Larry and I started to fish on the other side of Windy Hill in the brush. I caught the first fish on a buzz bait, and then Larry caught a number of fish on a Senko rigged wacky hook style. Everything was going great until Larry hooked a fish and slipped off his seat. I thought he had broken his back. He's a

tough old bird and he did get the fish in. We caught a lot of fish and then something happened. We had 5 fish in the live well, Larry caught a 6th fish, I opened the live well to get the smallest fish out to measure and a fish jumped out onto the deck. I was not quick enough to retrieve it and it went into the lake. It had to be the biggest fish, about 3 lbs. That fish would have made us a first place winner, as it was we took third place.

The Rules By Gary Grimes

If you are relatively new to Midweek Bass, you may wonder why we only had 6 weigh-in bags at the Roosevelt Lake tournament. Are we in need of money or are we just too frugal? The answer is neither. We have found the greatest way to minimize fish mortality is to reduce the amount of time the fish spend inside the oxygen limited weigh-in bags, and we accomplish this by limiting the number of bags available for weighing fish. Your fish will be much happier and healthier inside your oxygen rich live-well than in a bag. This restriction has no negative affect on the speed of the weigh-in, as there is always someone in line with fish to be weighed.

We managed to cull up a few times near the launch area while waiting for the end of the tournament.

As I was about to say piss poor for a number of reasons he never gave me a chance and went on with "Do you know that May 28 it will be 50 years since we crossed the fence the first time" (for our non-military people that meant doing a RECON mission into North Viet Nam and in this case our transportation was a parachute). I was floored; it seemed like yesterday, not 50 years ago, because I still remember how scared I was. After he hung up I sat and thought about the Special Operations teams I have been on and then I thought about our bass club and all of the members who served. I quickly came to the conclusion our club is just as fine an organization as any I have ever been with.

This labor day I want to thank the members of the club who served and tell a few stories about a few of them that you may not know. A good a place to start is with our former Marines, not Ex-Marines but

former. From the moment they earned their Globe and Anchor in boot camp their lives changed forever. For the rest of their lives, no matter what they achieved, the rest of the world will always know and refer to them as a Marine. Our club has a number of former Marines: Paul Archer, Gary Asmus, George Cobasky, and Gary Grimes.

Terry Tassin joined the Navy as an enlisted man and his way worked up Lieutenant Commander; very few people achieve this in the Navy. In early years Terry did not have an easy job in the Navy, he was a Navy Diver and EOD Tech (Explosive Ordnance Disposal). Terry and I were talking one day about diving at Indian Head, MD in the Potomac River and he was so cool about it. Diving at Indian Head was like diving in Chocolate Milk back then; it was so muddy and polluted you could not see your hand when placed in front of your face at two inches. You learned to feel your way around and at times you felt things that were bigger than you and then they swam away. To dive there over and over takes a special man who admits to his fear of unknown but never the seriously thinks of not diving. Terry made many dive's there more than I like to think of. Also serving in the USN: Steve Bowlin (10 Years), Lionel Frailey, Mike Halleck, and John Reichard.

Do any of you ever wonder why Larry White's boat is

wrapped in patriotic colors to honor returning heroes? Why, because Larry never stopped serving! Most of you don't know it but if Larry caught a five pound bass for every serious encounter he experienced in Nam we would not be taking about KVD but we would be talking about Larry. Larry's work was very classified and it was rare when he had more than a very few other people with him while working in the field. He has never forgotten those we left behind and how lucky he was to live through it. At Apache this year Larry walked up to me in the dark and quietly said "To those we left behind." As we tapped glasses for a toast he didn't say another word he just walked off to his camp site. Larry has never forgotten those he served with or those who didn't return home including his highly decorated close cousin Robert White.

Bernie Kowalski served multiple tours in Viet Nam. He survived numerous shelling from "Charlie" and never got to shoot back. Bernie was a bomb loader and the Air Force dropped lots of bombs but never had enough bomb loaders. Charlie did his best to kill the bomb loaders knowing if they did succeed in killing them more "Charlies" would survive. He beat the odds of Charlie missing him with various munitions. However, every time a tour was up and he was returning home to his wife he knew he could not beat the odds of him having to return to Nam for another tour of duty. I bet even though he didn't get to shoot back that he left more than one message on a bomb on it's way to make it a bad day for Charlie.
