Next Meeting Next Tournament

Our next club general meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, 1 July starting at 8:00 AM, at Valley **Airport** Deer Restaurant (just one mile I-101 north of at the intersection of 7th Ave & Deer Valley Road). We hope you will come early and have breakfast together.

The next club point tournament will be at Lake Bartlett on 15 July 2015. Club launch headquarters and weigh-in location will be announced. Tournament hours are Safe Light to 11 AM.

Team Bryan Steele & Rick Brown Squeak Out 1st Place Finish

Taking home 1st Place, Team Bryan Steele & Rick Brown brought to the scales the winning creel of five bass weighing 18.53 lbs. Thanks to Rick's 9.16 lb bass the team also wins the 1st Place Big Fish prize and 5 lb Option Pot. This bass moves to the top of the list for largest bass caught this year to date.

Bryan Steele: If you were near the Shiprock area around 6:15 AM, you probably heard some loud cheering. You guessed it that was all caused by Rick Brown catching the 9.16 pound largemouth. Not a bad way to fill out a limit! We didn't weigh the fish, and we didn't take a second look at it until the weigh-in. Our weight estimate started out at 8 pounds and by the end of the day, we figured it was definitely over five and had to be at least 6 something.

So when the scale went to 9.16 lbs, again, there was more cheering from us!

Rick fished great, and we had a blast all day! I am pretty sure he upgraded everything I put in the livewell and maybe I can claim 2 pounds of that entire bag! He had a late day upgrade that culled out a 1.87 pounder for an extra pound and that ended up putting us on top by 4/100's of a pound (or just .64 oz). It was one of those days where it all just worked out. Fantastic fishing Rick – way to go!

During pre-fish, I tried to find a shallow, heavy-cover bite, but did not succeed. I graphed a bunch of offshore spots and saw most of the fish scattered around the deep weed line that starts around 23 feet deep. That set the tone for our tournament plan, and staved offshore for 90% of the tournament. Most of our fish were caught in the 15 to 25 foot range. We just ran a bunch of mid-lake rocky points and weedy ledges all day. I caught my fish on dropshot finesse worms, and Rick caught his fish on Carolina rigged creature baits. In the last 30 minutes of

Tournament Statistics

Fifty men fished 6 hours each, bringing 116 keeper bass to the scales for a total weight of 261.88 pounds with a 5.24 pound average total catch per fisherman. The average weight of each fish was 2.26 lbs. All but five fish were released back into the lake after weighin to fight again another day.

the tournament, we ran down a line of habitat in 15-20 feet of water, which is where Rick got the final upgrade fish.

Rick Brown: Well, I have to say it again, "Another great draw for me". I had not had the privilege of meeting Bryan Steele prior to this tournament. We had planned on pre fishing on Monday, but due to that nasty word "work" I was not able to make it. On Tuesday Bryan filled me in on what he had found on Monday. The fish were set up right where I like them.

What a relief and excitement all at once when that fish was in the net. About 30 minutes later, Bryan gave me the "time to move" signal. I said "one more" and made a long cast out to a little deeper water and caught

a nice 3 lber.

Bryan continued to move us around and kept us on the fish while we slowly upgraded our smaller fish. I pretty much threw a Carolina rigged craw all day, targeting the +/- 25 foot depth. I really enjoyed fishing with Bryan; he might just be my new Best Friend! He is very knowledgeable about graphs, and really passionate about figuring out what the fish are doing. Thanks to Bryan's hard work (installing a new lower unit on his boat Saturday, putting us on fish, and then taking good care of them throughout the day) I was very fortunate in catching a great 9.16 lb bass, and my personal Arizona best.

He caught a 5.4 pounder and as he was coming in to the ramp with 3 minutes to go I hooked a 5.7 pounder and he watched us lip the fish into the boat because the net was buried under rods in the locker. Drop Shot Key to 3rd Place Finish for Wacker & Buchanan

Jim Buchanan: Alan and I started fishing on the right side of Shiprock in the brush. I was using a buzz bait and Alan was using a Rico lure. He caught a couple, I caught nothing. We moved down the lake and started fishing with drop shot. Fishing got better. We started sizing our fish and we mistakenly put our limit 5th fish back into the lake. Two hours left in the tournament and only 4 fish in the live well. Then we went over to Shiprock area again and bingo, I caught a 6.11 lb fish. On the way back to the dock we caught a 5 pounder. Most of the fish we caught were caught on drop shot rigs. Alan was a great boater and I hope we get to fish together again.

By the way, you are never too old to learn new tricks. Alan taught me how to hook the worm weedless on the drop shot and what hooks to buy. What a difference - no more snags, at least not that many.

Team Southard & Hand Fish River For 4th Place Overall Finish

Taking home **4th Place**, Team **Lew Southard & Spencer Hand** weighed five fish for a total weight of 15.10 lbs.

Lew Southard: I fished this tournament with Spencer Hand, one of our new members, and had a great time. We went to the river and stayed there all day. All of our fish came on a drop shot rig; three or four of the fish came off beds. Sean was fishing in that same area and left them for us, thanks Sean. The big fish was a cruiser and I threw my drop shot about four feet in front of her and she went right to my worm and ate it. That was what we needed to get us in the money.

Spencer Hand: Lew and I were both using drop shot rigs. His was a 5 inch Robo worm with a Chartreuse curly tail. I was using a Robo Worm FX straight tail in a purple color. We went almost to the up river dam but we caught most of our fish near the cliffs at the far end of the lake just about 200 yards from Cottonwood Wash. Early in the morning I almost took the first fish with a SPRO Frog in natural colors. He hit, I set, and the fish swam away.

I spotted a very large bass moving past the boat. Lew then spotted him and stated that it looked sick but threw his dropshot at it anyway. The bass took the worm quickly and Lew pulled him in with a little help from me with the net. We worked on several bedding bass - first time I ever did that and I caught two with our drop shot setup. Just for your information, I use a Pflueger Presidential reel set up with 8 lb Stren and Gamakatsu #2 hooks. The reel is on a 6' 6" Medium Lightening Stick.

Hopefully this is descriptive enough for the readers of this article. My brain is still a little fried after the day on the water in 114 degree heat, but a good fried! I look forward to the next tournament on Bartlett. I will pay more attention to everything. I was just a little overly excited.

I had a great time fishing in my first Arizona tournament. Lew was a great teacher and an all around great guy. I can't believe Lew and I took 4th Place which put us in a little money for my first tournament in Midweek Bass Anglers. Part of a dream comes true!

Steady Pays Off For Team Rojas & Riley For 5th Place Finish

Our day started slow and continued slow but steady, only one top water bass was caught by Richie and a very small blue gill (goon fish) was caught on my Rico. We both changed over to drop shot rigs and we slowly picked up a limit by mid morning then we were able to start culling and upgrading until weigh-in. We could not identify any sort of pattern, so both of us just kept changing colors, every color from A to Z, various anything to try to upgrade our fish. Only one fish was caught on a wacky worm and only one bass was caught on a top water lure, zero fish were caught on crank baits or rip baits.

Congratulations to all of the winners, and special big fish congratulations go out to Bryan Steele and Rick Brown for landing a 9.16 lb, Big Fish and 18.53 pounds total weight. Also congratulations to Tony Medina and Howard Thomas with a 6.42 lb big fish and a total weight of 18.49 pounds. Hopefully everyone is looking forward to another fun tournament at Bartlett Lake on July 15.

Team Ridgway & Mabry 6th Place Overall Finish

Taking home **6th Place**, Team **Vern Ridgway & Jeff Mabry** weighed five fish for a total weight of 13.14 lbs.

Jeff Mabry: Vern & I were both

on pretty good bites heading into this tournament. Our patterns didn't really produce until late in the tournament when we were lucky enough to stumble on to 3 and 5 pound fish. Unfortunately I made a massive mistake culling fish and left our smallest fish in the live well all day. Luckily the mistake only cost us one spot in the standings and \$15. Vern's is a great guy and anyone will be lucky to fish with him.

Ridgway: Jeff and I Vern teamed up with a plan and approach on how to execute our efforts. Our first stop produced a fish on a crankbait on the first cast of the game, a small one but a keeper in any case. We then moved into a cove where a good fish blew up on a top water plug. Jeff called for the net shortly after and we netted our first good keeper. Time to change locations. We lost a good one right away in the deep weeds of our new location. Five minutes later I dumped a 5 pounder at the boat on a Texas rig worm. Moving along, Jeff threw his lure off a deep point and called for the net, another good keeper for number 3. We then moved to a cove near Shiprock and caught another one on a crankbait (bluegill color) number 4 in the boat. Jeff called for the net again for number 5.....its now culling time. We then moved up to mid channel and Jeff was on the fish right away - we removed a small fish from the live well. The biggest fish came shortly afterwards. When Jeff yelled "fish on" I turned to see this large mouth trying to jump, I was there with the net and she turned out to be 5 plus pounds.

We then moved back to our starting spot but other than a couple of strikes, our plan had run its course.

Most of our fish came on worms, Texas rigs, Shakey Head set ups, and drop shot rigs.

Weighing-In

I wanted to take a few minutes to explain the Permit Process. In just two and half months we will be deciding 2016 Tournament our Schedule. I have had a few new members ask why so USDA who issues soon. permits for all of Tonto National forest has a long cycle for approving permits. Their cycle for permits starts October 1, 2015 and it is on a first come first served bases. Normally they will notify the various Tournament Directors and publish the date they will start taking calls at 8 AM on the published date for 2016 permits.

When I call in for permits I am given a number which is based on let's say I was the fourth call they answered so I would be assigned number four and later that day they will call me back after talking to the first three and we can request our desired dates to fish in 2016. However, even if they "tentatively" approve our dates we have many other hurdles to go through to obtain the permits, including

filing all of the after action certifications for our permits issued in 2015 and the clearing of any additional charges/fees we may have incurred, then payment in advance for all tournaments in 2016. Our fee for each tournament is based on the number of boats we think we will fish each tournament. If we guess to high refunds ARE NOT issued, if we guess to low we are charged for the additional boats plus a penalty cost for being to low. There is also a long list of dates that are not available for anyone to obtain a permit.

Our club lets the members decide when and where we want to fish. The process takes about two months to complete. That does not mean because we are first in line we will get all the dates we want. Each lake has restrictions on the number of boats allowed on lakes for tournaments and on some lakes the number of boats changes with the time of year. Each year the club's Board of Directors conducts a survey by listing all of the fishable lakes for each month and the members vote on where we want to fish. The members WHO VOTE DECIDE our desired schedule not the board. Our club's decision on where we want to fish does not mean we will get a permit to fish that lake on that date. What it does mean is that is our ONLY desired date and we apply for those dates.

Two weeks ago AZG&F met with the Forest Service to discuss putting limits on the number of tournaments to be held on certain lakes and several other restrictions. What they have decided for 2016 has not been finalized and we do not know at this time what they have decided. Lake Saguaro for example, because of the good fishing, had over 100 requests for permits in 2015 with some permits asking for 80 boats and clubs as far away as California wanting multiple day permits. It is obvious to everyone Saguaro cannot sustain this type of pressure without reducing the quality of fishing. AZG&F is determined to keep the quality of bass fishing excellent at the lakes that are currently good and improve all the other lakes they are responsible for (by the way, the city of Peoria is responsible for Lake Pleasant not AZG&F, so do not look for improvements at Pleasant). The only thing we know for sure is some type of change is coming and how it will affect us is unknown. We do know both agencies want to control the number of tournaments per year on given lakes and the number of tournament boats. How they accomplish this task is like I said - unknown.

This year we are listing all of the lakes we think the club could possibly fish including Alamo, Canyon and Martinez. Since our last vote on Martinez and Alamo for example we have had over 36% change in membership and most of them are dedicated fishermen and how they will vote - who knows. Alamo has very low water and no ramp to launch off of but AZ State Parks thinks we could safely launch off of the dirt at the end of the main road. At Canyon Lake the problem is at certain times of the year we will have a 30 boat limit and other times 70 boats. Clubs who fish Canyon typically have less than 15 boats due to the limited prime fishing areas. At local lakes we are constantly about 30 boats or more, if we go to Canyon how do we decide which 30 boats can fish? Martinez is a great fishery at certain times of the year. It is also the most controversial lake to list for a tournament. Water conditions and shifting sand bars make some fisherman very nervous. Others love the big 30 pound plus bags that sometimes come out of there in January and February for five fish. As a board all we can do is list the available lakes to fish then let the members decide.

What I do know is this year club members should all take extra time deciding how and where "they" want to fish. We cannot continue to fish Saguaro and Bartlett for half of our yearly tournaments and continue to grow the club and have great tournaments. Take a little extra time and if you have a question about a certain lake contact me (Jack Hughes) and I will get you the correct answer to your question.
