The 7th tournament of the year found the Midweek Bass Anglers at Lake Pleasant. Summer restrictions were still in place, which means a 3 fish limit and fishing only until 11AM. In spite of the shortened time and lower limits, we still had some impressive bags for what is considered by many to be one of the tougher lakes on our schedule. Congratulations to the team of Allen Wacker and Warren Brackey on the win with 11.11lbs. Well done gentlemen! Summertime fishing is the most challenging time of the year to keep fish alive on the boat. I made a huge mistake during the morning that eliminated our chances of finishing in the money. I knew fish care was going to be a challenge, so I had a gallon water bottle with a mixture of water and the additive Gjuice in order to help the fish. I had filled my livewell halffull prior to takeoff, and we soon had 3 fish in the boat. We checked the fish often, they were struggling to maintain upright, but were lively. We put some weighted clips on them and they seemed to be fine. About 9AM I decided to fill the livewell the rest of the way, as a way to introduce fresh oxygenated water. Unfortunately I forgot to turn my aerator back on. We checked the fish less than an hour later and they were completely dead. Talk about a shi##y feeling. Well, I knew we couldn't cull the fish, as they were dead, so we decided just to continue to fish and have fun. We later went on to catch a 3.4 and 2.95. Woulda, coulda, shoulda. Summertime water temps approach 90 degrees, so it doesn't take long to lose a fish.

Tournament Report Lake Pleasant July 21, 2021

Another hot day in paradise! It was "a bit" warm but it was still bearable. Let's hear from our winners on how they caught their fish at Lake Pleasant this month.

Team Allen Wacker & Warren Brackey Win 1st Place Team and 2nd Big Fish

Taking home 1st Place, Team Allen Wacker & Warren Brackey brought to the scales the winning creel of three bass weighing 11.11 lbs. Warren's 4.54 lb bass took 2nd Place Big Fish honors for the team.

Warren Brackey: Lake Pleasant in the middle of summer is a tough bass fishing challenge. Spending a few hours pre-fishing can be very helpful if conditions remain relatively stable, and if those wily creatures we love to chase stay put and wake up hungry tournament morning. Not too much to ask for, right? After that, all you need is a huge measure of fishing luck! This was certainly the case for Allen Wacker and me in this tournament.

I only knew of Allen from seeing him at club events and knew he was doing well in the year to date standings. This was the first time we were paired together and I was really looking forward to it. Allen wanted to prefish the Monday before the tournament. I was able to fish the lake the Friday before with my brother and Allen fished it with a buddy on Saturday. Our so-so results gave us a lot of good ideas about where not to go and what not to do

We fished several of Allen's secret spots on Monday. Allen caught a good drop shot fish in the first spot we stopped, so we took note, reeled up and moved on. About mid-morning we headed to Coles' Bay. We

pulled up outside on the right side as you head in and started fishing points, drop shotting in 20 to 25 feet. Allen was fishing a purple Punisher and I had on a 7 inch Baitball, Fat straight tail Robo Worm. As we continued to the next point, the depth changed abruptly to 35 to 40 feet. Seconds later a good fish slammed my worm. We got the fish near the boat, it looked to be a three pounder or better, and there was another fish the same size swimming along side! That fish came unbuttoned without doing much damage to my setup, so I pitched it back into the same pocket. As soon as it hit bottom my worm was slammed again. It was another 3 plus! It was time to move on once again. We now had a good plan for Wednesday morning.

On tournament day we stopped at the first spot we fished on Monday. About thirty minutes and one dink later we made our way to our spot in Coles' Bay. About 45 minutes of fishing later we had two fish in the live well, but they were not the ones we hoped would be there. Just before 7 AM my dropshot bumped against something, I lifted it up slightly and WHAM!! Our limit fish, a 3 plus, was soon in the net. Now the question was, were there others around? Zero bites and an hour later, there was no action so we moved off our spot. We fished the shoreline southward for about 45 minutes and caught some smaller fish. Then another boat moved into our area on the opposite side of the bay. That is when Allen decided we should move back on our spot. That move is what led us to the most amazing sequence of events I have ever experienced in my four years fishing with Midweek Bass. About 8:45 Allen steered back across our point, much like we did on Monday. He kept giving me the depth as the back graph was off to conserve power. "We're at 25 feet, 35 feet, now 42 feet," he reported. As soon as we hit that pocket, another good fish nailed my Roboworm. It was another 3.25 pounder! "It was like Déjà Vu all over again!" After getting that fish in the well and re-rigging we had drifted off our spot about 20 yards or so. I cast back into the pocket, bounced my drop shot a couple times and BOOM, another 3.25 pounder engulfed my worm! It was truly an unbelievable sequence, and the best part, it was

about to get even better. After securing our third 3 plus fish in the live well, I cast back into that pocket, bounced my drop shot a couple times and WHAM; another big fish was on and taking drag. Clearly our best fish of the day, a 4.54 pounder, was soon in the boat. We culled one of the 3.25 pounders and fished the area for another hour or more before heading to the weigh-in. What an amazing morning on Lake Pleasant, one I will recall and retell to those who are willing to listen for many years.

I had a great time fishing and getting to know Allen better. He's a great guy, a great fisherman and a very experienced tournament angler. It would be my good fortune to be paired with him again anytime.

Congrats to all who placed and caught a big fish in this event. It was a hard fought competition with a good number of nice bass caught. Kudos to our club staff and stellar weigh-in team for putting on another great tournament. Well done, guys. Looking forward to seeing you all next month at Lake Bartlett.

Steve Grier & Rick Harang Drop Shot Deep and Finish 2nd Overall

In 2nd Place Team Grier & Harang weighed three bass for a total weight of 10.94 lbs. Thanks to Steve's 4.80 lb bass the team also won 1st Place Big Bass honors

Steve Grier: Congrats to Allan and Warren, that was a heck of a bag. Shout out to the weigh-in crew for a job well done as always. Rick Harang and I spent a couple days pre-fishing and identified 10 spots where we got good bites and might be able to catch bigger fish. We went to the first spot and threw topwater for 15 minutes without a bite. We pulled out the drop shot rods and started fishing the structure in 25-40 feet. Within 5 minutes we had our first fish in the boat and it was 3.5 lbs. Over the next couple of hours, we caught about 10-12 fish including a 2.9 and a 4.8 pounder. The big fish was caught in about 40 feet and struggled from the beginning. It had the hook deep in it's throat so we cut the line. We put on belly weights, then fizzed it and added oxygen. In spite of our efforts, it was dead within an hour. Sometimes it happens but I hate having a fish die, especially a big one. And in this case, it had significant ramifications at the weigh-in. The bite quit on our spot after 7:30 so we fished several of the other spots on our list and caught a few fish, a couple over 2 lbs but nothing that would help. It was clearly a morning bite for us. We fished main lake points from the north end to the 10-lane ramp area in 25-40 feet. We caught our fish on dropshot 5150 worms (morning dawn) and C-rig (BBH electric shad). The big fish came on my C-rig.

After losing, missing or breaking off a number of fish, we started catching them on DS using 5150 worms. We caught our fish much shallower than most others did. Our fish came in the river. Thanks Tom for a fun day!

Bill Ryan & Joe Michels Work
Main Lake Points

Take 4th Place

Taking home **4th Place**, Team **Bill Ryan & Joe Michels** weighed three bass for 9.15 pounds and took home **Fourth Place** honors.

Joe Michels: Neither Bill nor I have had much time on Lake Pleasant in the past few years, so we decided to use what worked last month as a starting point for our pre-fish on Tuesday. Given that the water is dropping dramatically, it was evident that exact spots from last month were very different now. We had to figure out where the fish moved. We also concentrated on areas that were typical summer locations, bluffs, long points, humps, and steep banks.

Topwater worked well on Tuesday because the clouds were thick and lasted well after Sun Rise. We had many topwater hits that clued us into trying topwater on tournament day. When that slowed, we switched to dropshot and old school Wired Worms and started to pick up fish. We found one area with a unique structure holding fish; our biggest fish was just under two pounds on Tuesday. Our thought process was to start on our best spot and hope for the best.

Bill worked a Rico, and within the first 20 minutes, he landed a three-pound fish. That was our first fish and a great way to start the tournament. We only caught one more topwater fish the rest of the morning due to the lack of cloud cover. We continued to work in the area with a large population of fish with plastics and soon had a limit that included a two and half-pounder.

Sometimes random luck is needed to do well in a tournament, and that happened to me. I was fishing a Jrig swim tail Senko and threw right to a small bluff; a three and a half-pounder ate the bait as it hit the water. That fish was up feeding in shallow water, and I unknowingly cast right to it. Luck, I'll take that any day.

We had our weight by 7 am and knew that we were in toad hunting mode with no place to hunt. We did catch another ten fish the rest of the morning and threw several fish over two pounds back but could not upgrade our weight.

Thanks to all that help with the tournament including Mr. Terry Tassin for all his work behind the scenes.

Bill Ryan: I was fortunate enough to be paired with Joe Michels for the Lake Pleasant tournament. We pre-fished the lake the day before and established a

Tournament Statistics

Forty-six contestants fished 6 hours each, bringing 67 bass to the scales for a total weight of 142.58 pounds with a 3.10 pound average total catch per fisherman. The average weight of each fish was 2.13 lbs. All but six fish were released alive back into the lake after weigh-in to fight again another day.

pattern of topwater, drop shot, and Wired Worms. Joe had a good read of the lake and was essential in establishing our patterns. On the day of the tournament we caught fish on all our established patterns and had a limit by 7:30 am and were then able to cull some smaller fish. We fished mostly main lake points. Towards the end of the morning we were releasing 2 pound fish without being able to cull. A great day on the lake.

Jeff Mason: Congrats to Allen and Warren in winning on another tough day on Lake Pleasant, and great job to the 2nd through 4th Place teams. Another great job to the weigh-in guys! One of the things I like the most about Midweek Bass is it's policy of a random drawing pairing up boaters and non boaters. Working

together and sharing techniques and information trying to produce the best weight possible for your team really brings you together after a day of fishing. I've always felt the learning goes both ways between the boater and non boater. Keith and I started and stayed in the main lake all day and just moved from one side to the other side fishing points and rocky banks in 10 - 30 feet of water. I caught our first 5 keepers on a drop shot in the first 2 1/2 hours and had maybe 6 lbs with no big fish. Keith was having a tough morning until he caught his first keeper at around 8:45, a beautiful 3 1/2 pounder on a flick shake worm. What did you catch that on? About an hour later he caught another 3 1/2 pounder on another flick shake worm! Thanks for showing me how to fish the flick shake worm Keith and making me a believer.

Yes, I did place an order with Tackle Warehouse when I got home.

Team James Duel & Otto Gal Fish Main Lake Islands To Win 6th Place

Team **James Duel & Otto Gal** weighed three bass for 7.12 pounds and took home **6th Place**.

James Duel: When it's hot we all appreciate the weigh-in crew getting us in and out quickly. Thank you guys. Congratulations to Warren and Allen on their first place win and Steve Grier's boat for big fish.

My co-angler Otto Gal could not meet me to prefish. However, my neighbor Dave Sapyta and I went out twice and he put me on some good spots that I used on Wednesday.

Otto and I started fishing shallow and quit that after 40 minutes of catching no fish. We switched to drop shotting and Otto pulled in our first fish that made it to the scales. We moved out to the islands in the main lake and caught the other two bass using Robo Worms ox blood color with red flake. All fish were caught deep in 25 to 35 feet..

However, we need to take a class on how to "fizz" the bass. Apparently, many floaters were left at the ramp after the tournament. Thankfully, a concerned volunteer (James Duel) reported back to me he went down and rescued the fish. Thanks Jim!

Bottom line is if the fish are sideways in your livewell, they will float upon release. Please try to needle your fish BEFORE you bring them to the scales. If you are not sure how to do it, ask and a member will help you. I will send out information on needling fish in our next Info Gram next month.

Again, I have to say our crack weigh-in team did an excellent job. John Hilland, Floyd Vaughan, Gary Grimes, Warren Brackey, and Tom Savage, you guys are the best. Special thanks to Joe Michels for stepping up to provide shuttle service. We are always looking for volunteers to help run the club functions, come see me if you want to help.
