








Jeff Mabry (AOY 2019): What a year. I can't remember a year where fishing was so tough on a regular basis and there were several months when I thought getting a limit was going to be tough. I understand cold months, but Bartlett in August or Roosevelt in September! I know we had some fronts move in during our tournaments early in the year, but I am guessing it was fishing on the full moon that had the most to do with it. Luckily next year most of our tournaments are on a new moon and fishing should be better.

With that said I think Midweek members (and most other tournaments) need to focus on fish care. In looking back at this year's results we weighed in 42 dead fish. I know at times it can't be helped, but I also know it can be.

In the winter fish are typically caught deep and race to the top. They do not have time to empty their air

bladder and typically float belly-up. If a fish is floating in your live well it isn't okay. At times when we first catch them they will lay there for a few minutes, but after that they should be able to stay upright. I have caught fish in 5 feet of water that have floated. We don't have a clue where they came from to get that bait. Fish belly weights are a great option for keeping them upright and letting them slowly release the air from their swim bladder. start pouring them and the entire club can have them in their boat. I also use the paper clips shown in the picture above with a ½ ounce weight on each arm. They are cheap and work pretty well. Any weight you make or purchase will rust and not last too long, so I use these and keep plenty in my boat.

At times the weights aren't enough and the fish need to be fizzed. I personally don't like going through the mouth. I buy 25 gauge needles from the feed stores and do it from the side. Here is a great video;

Weighted fish stay upright and alive, but sometimes they still can't regulate their swim bladder. If you release them over the deepest water possible (end of the dock) it gives them the chance to swim down and regulate themselves. More than once this year I saw anglers releasing from the ramp trying to keep their feet dry. This doesn't work!

In the summer fish are shallower, but the surface of the water gets warm. If you have ever taken a swim in our lakes you know the water is warm the first 5-10 feet, but then gets much cooler as you dive down. Our live wells unfortunately only take water from a foot or so below the surface, so we are putting warm, less oxygenated water in our live well. Some people use ice which is great, but doesn't last long. Frozen water bottles work great too if you have enough room to store them. I personally put my recirculation on high and my fresh water on high. I try and keep as much water going through my live well as possible. I know this is tough on batteries, but I also invested in an *X2 Battery* from Batteries Plus to avoid issues.

Anyone that has fished with me this year will attest that I spend a lot of my day tending to fish needs to keep them healthy. I weighed 49 fish in the 10 tournaments I fished with Midweek this year, and countless other fish from other circuits, all of them swam away healthy. Anything I am posting in this article has come from trial and error. I have killed many fish in my day, but I have learned from it and hope to never have another die.

Hope everyone enjoys their Holidays and I will see you next year to protect my title.

Tom Alauria – Keeping Your Equipment Alive: I'm sure that all of we boaters have experienced one or all of the following. You burn a bearing on your trailer, you break a trolling motor cable, or the bolts on your trailer fall out due to vibration, or something happens to your boat motor. Well, there are preventative measures you can take like tightening bolts and checking your bearing grease, but these things often occur when you are a hundred miles from home. This happened to me at Alamo last month. I couldn't get my motor to go down. It turned out that it was a bad solenoid. Vern Ridgway saw me working on my motor and he had one that worked on my engine. Thanks again Vern.

Over the years I've put together a box of things that have helped me and others. These things include bailing wire, duct tape, wire ties, and a bag of assorted nut bolts and hose clamps. I also carry a spare wheel hub and grease as well as spare props and lower unit oil and yes, spare solenoids.

The reason I'm telling you all this is because I want everyone to get back on the water, home safely, and I'll do everything I can to help you. If I have the parts you need, you are more than welcome to them.

Terry Johnson: 2019 was a very

fulfilling year for me in Midweek. I can't thank enough all the folks who make our tournaments run like clockwork. From the entries and draws through publication of the results and the emails, it's all so painless for the rest of us. On a couple of occasions, I needed help launching. No problem, multiple volunteers. Twice I had to cancel because of chronic health issues, no problem. My nonboaters were all helpful and enthusiastic. When I offered to go nonboater because of an imbalance, my boaters were fantastic. The campground camaraderie was wonderful. I had a ball all year and I even picked up a few checks along the way. So, thank you, Midweek Bass Anglers, you have enriched this Old Fart's golden years and I look forward to the same in 2020. I'm taking it one year at a time!

Charlie Mackintosh - Back to Arizona: It's early December and I'm standing in my garage in Michigan looking at rods and tackle scattered over the bed of my truck. I'm trying to pull together the tackle I will need to fish the 1st MBA tournament of 2020 at Bartlett Lake. It has been nearly 20 years since I wet a line in Arizona. In the 90's I had a team partner and we fished the All-Star aluminum boat trail. It was a lot of fun. My note taking back then was not that great, but I dug up some notes on Bartlett to help pull my gear together.

I've been fishing the last 6 years in Michigan and have not once weighed in a largemouth; it has all been smallmouth. I learned in 2012 I would need to relocate from the Finger Lakes region in NY to Michigan. NY was a fishing dream with anything from the Great Lakes of Erie and Ontario to smaller

finger lakes, including Conesus which often kicked out 20+ pound bags. The St. Lawrence River and Champlain were within a day's drive and Oneida and Cayuga were only hours away. NY had smallmouth and largemouth and multiple tournament trails including clubs, the NY Bass Fed, ABA, BFL and routine visits from BASS Opens and the FLW Costa series.

Michigan on paper looked less appealing. The only major trail outside of clubs was the BFL and it focused almost exclusively on Lake St. Clair and the Detroit River which are actually connected and therefore the same venue. In terms of the variety of venues, it looked boring. But on fishing Lake St. Clair, I instantly fell in love. The lake occupies over 400 square miles of area, a relatively small catch basin connecting Lake Huron to Lake Erie. It is a shallow bowl, with a max depth of roughly 20-22 feet. Lake water is typically changed out in a period of 7 days. The lake is loaded with huge smallmouth and in late summer through fall bags of over 30 lbs - 5 fish bag limit, have been weighed for team events. Likewise, Lake Erie can deliver huge bags of fish that come with long runs and often severe boat beatings.

Fishing Lake St. Clair almost exclusively was like having a fishing laboratory. I was able to hone in on the seasonal patterns and experiment with various techniques. My strength was the drop shot and using electronics, but I expanded to using spy baits, crankbaits and swimbaits. And I learned some of the unique geographic spots. I leave the job unfinished as each passing year unlocks new secrets. Michigan fishing, like NY, was a dream.

Now, my wife and I are ready to leave the cold northern winters behind. She wasn't interested in moving to the southeast and she also declined on moving back to her home state of Texas. We agreed on Arizona. So, as we straddle both states while we work on our relocation, I looked at the various

We used to have hangovers From parties that were gay. Now we suffer body aches And while the night away.


We use to go out dinning And couldn't get our fill. Now we ask for doggie bags Come home and take a pill.

Winter Wonder Land Arizona Style


Palm trees wave, are you listenin?

Livin in the Arizona wonderland.


