




Angler of the Year 2020 Sean Ballard



The memories I made this year I will hold on to for the rest of my life. I'll be 90 years old hanging out with Floyd and thinking back to 2020 as the year I brought 5 fish, and not 6 fish, to the scales at each tournament and managed to win AOY with the Midweek Bass Anglers of Arizona.

**Charles Mackintosh:** Reflections on my first year with MBA.

Once retired, my wife and I decided to return to Arizona. I fished with a great club when I lived in New York but in Michigan, our most recent locale, I never joined a club and missed that aspect of fishing. So, I searched online for a club and found MBA. The MBA club concept far exceeded my expectations. Midweek tournament dates and randomized team draws are great, innovative features and ones I have not seen with any other clubs. The monthly Bass Bites write up assembled by Terry is fantastic. And the camping and camaraderie associated with the "road" tournaments are welcoming social events. The club designers have my admiration. And the club officials have my gratitude for the hard work and dedication that does into executing the well-run tournaments every month. Thank you to the partners I drew this year who shared their boats and friendship.

By design, the club is competitive at a fun level, but also fosters great learning opportunities so that we can all continue improving our fishing skills. Randomized draws assure the exposure to partners with various specialized skill sets and the Bass Bites write-ups share techniques and strategies of the top finishers.

Though my angling aptitude is nothing exceptional, I have learned a few useful things over time. With that in mind, I would like to share some fishing observations others may find interesting and helpful.

So, we all know fish see color, right? I always wondered, how the heck does anyone know what fish can see? One day, I was walking the banks of the Black river in AZ casting from shore. There was a decent smallmouth bite in the river and my wife and I had a fun time hiking and fishing. Late in the day on the way back to camp, we hit a spot in the river where there must have been a good school of fish because every cast produced a fish. Small, <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> to 1 lb fish, but fun. Well as time went by, the bite eventually died. At that point, I stayed with the exact same bait, a small grub on a jig head, but changed to a different color. The voracious bite resumed. I had my proof that fish see color. I also learned that fish become conditioned and can learn and that a small change can fire a school back up and that a voracious school of fish offers an opportunity to experiment.

The lessons from that day helped me in later tournaments. I learned the importance of rotating baits when in a school of fish and to always have a follow up rod and bait ready for a missed bite. If pre-fishing a tournament and I find active fish I may try some baits other than my preferred selection to see what else is working or if something is working better.

Is there anything more frustrating than being in a boat with someone who is slamming fish while you are hauling water? Especially if you are using the exact same bait. I imagine everyone has had this happen to them at some point. I don't have all the answers to why, but I

#### have a few ideas.

One day, my friend and I were fishing for smallies on a large flat during pre-spawn. One of our go to baits at the time was a lipless crankbait. My buddy goes to town and starts hauling them in steadily while I can't get bit. Same bait, same color, I can't get bit. After a couple of hours, I conclude there is something wrong with my bait and I decide to switch. Slow learner, but hit me with hammer long enough and I'll eventually figure it out. Well, as I go to cut off the bait, I notice a tine on one of the two trebles is slightly bent. Instead of swapping the bait, I replaced the hook and resumed fishing. After the hook change my catch rate was on par with my buddy.

At that point a light bulb went on in my head. A tournament disaster from about 10 years prior had been haunting me. It was a two-day BFL super tournament on Lake Champlain. I had several days of practice and had established a simple but reliable white spinnerbait pattern. I had decent spots lined up and felt pretty confident going into the tournament. Early in the tournament I had a hard hit and soon realized it was no bass but a large Northern Pike. I unhooked it, released it and resumed fishing. I never had another bite that day. The co-angler in my boat had a good day, throwing a white spinner bait and harvesting enough fish from each of my spots to qualify for day two. So, what happened? I'm sure a white spinnerbait was a great choice to throw that day so sticking with it was not the problem. But my white spinnerbait was likely damaged from the Northern Pike and I should have just switched it out for another white spinnerbait.

If your boat partner is whipping' you with the same bait, look for small subtle differences. Besides a damaged bait, it could be a heavy wire hook vs. a light wire hook, retrieve speed or technique, a difference in drop shot or sinker weight, etc. Be assured there is a subtle difference somewhere; it is just a matter of finding it.

I'm thankful and grateful for the opportunity to fish with MBA in 2020, and I'm looking forward to fishing with you all in 2021. Best wishes to your and your families for the Holidays! Charlie Mackintosh






